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1. Introduction to Pragati Abhiyan

Pragati Abhiyan has been working in Tribal blocks of Trambakeshwar, Peith, Surgana and Igatpuri in Nashik district, Mokhada block of Palghar district and Shahapur block of Thane district of Maharashtra since 17 years. This area being hilly and with poor accessibility the government schemes don't reach them properly. Although they are the neediest population there is lack of awareness and knowledge among them. The government machinery alone is not sufficient to reach these people and ensure uptake of government schemes by them. Over the years we have identified some key areas which need to be addressed for holistic development of tribal families. We have been mainly focusing on awareness generation and knowledge transfer to tribal people on MGNREGA, PMFBY, and Revival of millets, Bamboo promotion and National Food Security Act. These schemes serve to provide employment security, financial security, food security and an important right which above all provides voice to the suppressed population.

Pragati Abhiyan works towards developing solutions that create an enabling environment for the poor to break out of the poverty trap. These solutions are in the form of ensuring effective delivery of existing government programs as well as devising new programs to address communities' needs, and build evidence through research articulating specific changes in policies. Underlying our work is the strong belief that it is ultimately the mandate of the Government to support the poor in their efforts to move out of poverty.








2. 2022-23 at a glance

Throughout this financial year 2022-23, the organization has made strides across various initiatives. One of these endeavors, MGNREGA, aimed to create employment prospects during the off-season of agriculture. Another initiative, ANAVIKA, focused on enhancing millet productivity to bring benefits to families of tribal farmers. The Rebuilding Inclusive Lives and Livelihoods (RILL) initiative was dedicated to supporting impoverished families who lost their primary breadwinners due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Moreover, the promotion of bamboo cultivation aimed to provide an additional income source for tribal families. The overarching objective was to uplift the living standards of the most economically disadvantaged tribal households.

Over the course of the year, the team displayed remarkable dedication in extending their efforts to the widest possible community outreach. The DASARA project had a positive impact on 25 families, either by providing them with goats and hens or by bolstering their existing livelihoods. The implementation strategy ensured that each family could leverage local resources and use funds to acquire goats or hens that were locally available. In the ANAVIKA project, the improved package of practices instilled a strong sense of confidence, backed by more than 5 years of expertise in millet cultivation. The farmers underwent training at various stages, from planting to harvesting. MGNREGA, which not only targeted tribal families but also encompassed 17 blocks across 13 districts in Maharashtra, played a pivotal role in offering earning opportunities to the most financially vulnerable. The success of MGNREGA fostered a sense of assurance among Community Resource Persons (CRPs), making their participation in MGNREGA a mandatory parameter to catalyze development within low-income households. The farmer groups were fortified through the provision of capacity-building trainings, ensuring their optimal performance. Additionally, crop insurance was extended to cover millet and other crops, serving as a protective measure for farmers against a range of risks. The Bamboo promotion initiative delved into the understanding of local circumstances and the status of bamboo cultivation. This year, particular attention was given to the current state of bamboo and the need for its strengthening.





3. Programmes

3.1 Rebuilding Inclusive Lives and Livelihoods progress (RILL)

The second wave of Covid-19 affected rural parts of Maharashtra severely. Pragati Abhiyan did COVID relief work in 3 districts and 7 blocks of Maharashtra. During this, we conducted a primary survey of 1800 households, distributed COVID equipment and protective gear, spread awareness through ICE material distribution and conducted vaccination drives in villages. Through our household survey, we understood the seriousness and spread of COVID in these villages and need to rebuild livelihood of families who lost earning members in Igatpuri, Trimbakeshwar and Peith block of Nashik.

3.1.3 Project Area

The project was executed in 10 villages located within the Trimbakeshwar, Igatpuri, and Peith blocks.

3.1.4 Activities undertaken

1. Need assessment

We conducted meeting with families affected by Covid in each villages of Trimbakeshwar, Igatpuri and Peith block, after identifying affected households. Listing of beneficiaries by selecting villages, visiting Panchayat samiti, Gram Panchayat and household to identify families affected by COVID death.

2. List of livelihoods

The list of livelihood with each beneficiary was finalized and was further classified into three major livelihood opportunities namely poultry, goat rearing, and small entrepreneurship activities which includes two grocery shop, a sewing machine and bangles.

3. Training and meetings

Total six trainings were conducted at different levels, First training was done with five Community Resource Persons on how to conduct primary survey, other trainings were done with beneficiaries on various topics like maintaining a daily record, feed management, shelter management, and health management by Dr. Purushottam Gorole and Sajal Kulkarni who are expert on animal husbandry training.

4. Vaccination and insurance of livestock

Insurance of 27 goats in Igatpuri is completed with Oriental Insurance Company. For goats Enterotoxaemia Cum Lamb Dysentery Vaccine (ETV) two times, and FMB and PPR vaccination one time are given. Devi and ranikhet vaccination is given to chickens in Peith block.

5. First aid kit and banner distribution

We have distributed first aid kit to all the livestock beneficiaries with banner to track their day to day activities. Followed by online zoom meeting on contents and use of first aid kit. This will help in timely health monitoring and disease control of livestock.

We have also applied for cattle shed for goat rearing and for backyard poultry under MGNREGA scheme.

3.2 For Implementation of MGNREGA (FINE)

The current project was designed to increase involvement of CSO's across Maharashtra from different regions to study the difficulties in implementation of NREGA and to provide a report to Government of Maharashtra to further policy decisions to overcome the issues. The project is also intended to enhance capacity building of CRPs on NREGA who are working with a cluster of villages in a selected block. These CRP's were working with local village body implementing NREGA and ensure smooth functioning of the scheme. They act as mediators between the implementing PRI's and labors so that the problems of the labors are addressed and solved in effective way.

3.2.3 Project Area

The project was implemented in over 25 villages within each of the 17 blocks spanning across 13 districts in Maharashtra. These blocks are Majalgaon (Beed), Bhadravati (Chandrapur), Arjuni Morgaon (Gondia), Renapur (Latur), Kuhu (Nagpur), Hadgaon (Nanded), Igatpuri, Peith, Surgana, Trambakeshwar (Nashik), Tuljapur (Osmanabad), Mokhada (Palghar), Sangole (Solapur), Shahapur (Thane), Arvi (Wardha), and Umarkhed (Yavatmal).





A. No. of Households availed job



B. No of person availed job




C. Persons days

3.3 Adivasi Nagali Vikas Karyakram (ANAVIKA)

Finger Millet is one of the minor millets which is very important nutritionally. Yet it is losing its place in our plates due to lowering of productivity as well as lowering of area under production. The purpose of this programme is to revive finger millets.

3.4 Bamboo Promotion

Due to lack local market for bamboo in Nashik district farmers are not able to earn commercially from bamboo. Due to the changes in the standard of living in the last few decades, the traditional and skilled bamboo artisans are losing ground. In some places skilled workers are not available to cut bamboo, while in some places harvesting tools are not available. Hence, although bamboo is a source of income, it is neglected. Due to the proper management of bamboo plot in Sindhudurg district in the last few years, the income of the farmers there has increased. By properly managing bamboo plantation and selling good quality bamboo, farmers can add well to their annual income. But for that, farmers need training about how to take care of bamboo.





3.5 Integrated Farming Cluster (IFC)

Adivasi farmers from Nashik district in Maharashtra have been growing Nagali - Finger Millet - for generations. But recently, they are experiencing low productivity owing to diseases and vagaries of nature. Reduced yield means the inability to meet family needs and the compulsion to use other non-staple grains like wheat. Apart from causing a dent in their already poor earnings, this also compromises their food and nutritional security. IFC is Integrated Farming Cluster. The activities of this project are to be organized with the State Rural Livelihoods Mission – Umed. SRLM has formed many Self-help Groups and they work only with the members of such groups. We are providing training to these women members in cultivation practices of Nagali, making child friendly snacks of Nagali. We have also trained groups in livestock management. This is program constituted by a national network, RCRC. This type of collaboration is in around 8 States across the country.

3.6 Zilla Parishad members - training

This study is to capture performance of elected members of Zilla Parishad. If a systematic training is provided then their performance will get more effective. In the first phase of this study, we interviewed 30 elected representatives to understand their present sources of collecting information understanding of the processes to get programs sanctioned in their constituency. We have prepared training modules and are ready to start training. But due to some technical reasons the elections are being postponed and presently Nashik Zilla Parishad is being run by the Chief Executive Officer. Once the elections are over, we plan to start trainings some of them over one year.



4. Research and studies

1. Cook Stove

A student from Yale University wanted to do a study on use of Induction Cookstove, which uses Electricity as fuel. Pragati Abhiyan supported her in identifying villages, identifying households and conducting surveys. In this study, induction cook stoves were given to families and they were given training to use it. Every month their use of the stove was monitored. Amalta, the student, has all the data and she is working on it.

2. AFARM

Mahindra and Mahindra Company wanted a scoping study to be done around Igatpuri and Nashik villages. They approached AFARM, the network of CSOs based in Pune. Since we are placed in Nashik, AFARM collaborated with us to conduct the scoping study.

3. NREGA Consortium is a network of CSOs working on NREGA across 8 states in the country. Consortium planned to conduct a study to understand 3NREGA's performance during Covid pandemic and lockdown. A survey across 5 States to collect primary data of 5 villages per Block and xx households per Block. In Nashik, we did the survey in Surgana block. NCEAR and APU was involved in designing the Survey and preparing the report. The Maharashtra report was presented to the MGNREGA Commissioner in Nagpur in the presence of CSO representatives. The national report was presented to Government officials, journalists and representatives from CSOs in Delhi.

4. Pragati Abhiyan is a member of network RCRC. This network was formed to address the Covid pandemic and lockdown related issues in rural parts of India. To understand and respond to the crisis, RCRC with its partners conducted quick assessment of the situation in villages of India. Then these were repeated over two years which helped in mapping the problems and possible ways to work around these new challenges. The latest report is being published and Pragati Abhiyan conducted household survey in Igatpuri.



5. Awards and Recognition

We are happy to share that Pragati Abhiyan's case study titled 'Revival of a Superfood', based on its Nagali rejuvenation initiative with farmers in Nashik, Thane and Palghar districts, has been awarded by the 'Stories of Change' - Case Study Challenge' hosted by Azim Premaji University, Bangalore in 2022-23. This was 4th edition of the annual challenge that facilitates documentation of good practices by the organizations who are directly involved in design and implementation of development interventions. Our case study was appreciated and received second prize. It will soon be published along with other shortlisted stories and the compendium will be made available on our website.

NITI Aayog has published a compendium on the topic of disaster management and climate change. In this Pragati Abhiyan's ANAVIKA project is explained in terms of its climate resilience.




6. PA networks

7. Publications during FY 2022-23

The book titled “पाऊलवाट हमरस्ता होतांना” was released on Buddha Purnima 2022. It contains the experiences of CRPs, community members, government employees involved in MGNREGA, and Pragati Abhiyan workers regarding their experiences, real-life incidents while ensuring work under MGNREGA, and the impact of MGNREGA as well as how life has changed as a result of activities like farm pond construction, mango cultivation, and loose boulder structures carried out under MGNREGA. 25 case studies from all around Maharashtra are included in the publication. The CRPs of more than ten partner organizations wrote these case studies. To ensure the quality of these case studies, each author received fundamental guidance during a write shop held in March 2022. These case studies were documented for three primary purposes: to raise awareness about NREGA within the community, to analyze past work for learning purposes, and to draw inspiration from the experiences shared. Some case studies delve into work carried out several years ago and examine its lasting impact, while others highlight the challenges faced by CRPs and workers in implementing NREGA activities at the village level over the past two years. During the COVID-19 pandemic, MGNREGA played a crucial role in providing support to several community members during critical times in their lives. Certain case studies also offer insights into planning NREGA activities, ensuring a demand for labor work, and persuading the community to initiate MGNREGA activities.
